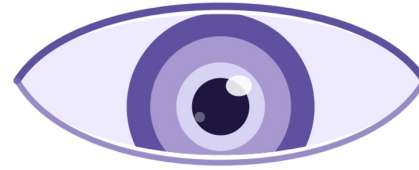

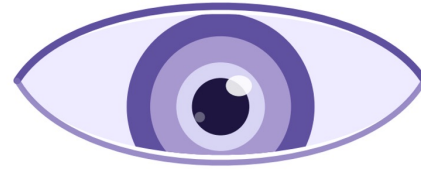


Lawyers lack clarity and visibility, they need narratives

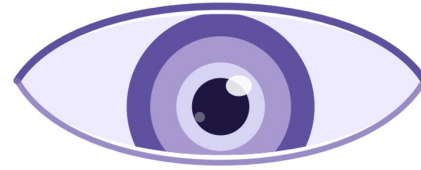

We connect the dots: victims are identified and supported

We cannot prevent violence, but we can accelerate justice

From the victim's perspective: **increased prevention**

From the lawyer's perspective: **accelerated process**

Externalization

- Potential victim expresses him/herself and externalizes his/her doubt in the app.
- There is no need for structure, she is not limited by anything.
- The outcome is an externalized and anonymous narratives.

Empathy

- By analyzing the narrative from outside, the potential victim can empathize with the protagonist(s).
- She/he is able to critically assess the situation with a clear mind and with rationality.

Realization

- Being confronted to a dissociated narrative, she/he can choose to proceed with a claim and request the support of a lawyer.
- The potential victim does not have to compromise her/himself by visiting or contacting lawyers.

Automatic flow

- Lawyers do not need to seek for potential victims, the claims directly flow to their app.
- They save time for actual claims processing and qualitative work.

Clarity

- Lawyers are served with anonymous and tangible narratives, not discharged from emotional impact + an initial report and classification (0-10 case materiality).
- They can ask clarifying questions to the app to get original data (anonymous voice records, NLP statistics).

Direct action

- Lawyers can contact potential victims ("qualified leads") to prepare (proof collection) and start a legal action ASAP; with the preliminary data they have.
- Victim's side has a "first-mover" advantage before filling an official lawsuit.
